FARALLON ISLANDS NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

The islands of the Farallon Islands National Wildlife Refuge are managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and are located nearly 30 miles off the coast of San Francisco. The Farallones host globally significant wildlife populations, including hundreds of thousands of seabirds and thousands of seals and sea lions. They are also a place of science where biologists from Point Blue Conservation Science study this complex ecosystem every day of the year, looking at the data to find ways to guide conservation and restoration of the islands in the face of climate change and other threats.

NATIONAL CONSERVATION TRAINING CENTER

The Eagle Cam information chronicles the activities of the eagle nest located on the grounds of the US FWS National Conservation Training Center near the Potomac River in Shepherdstown, West Virginia. The nest has been active during nesting seasons starting in 2005. The eagles have fledged a number of juvenile bald eagles over the years.





DING DARLING NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Take a glimpse of what wildlife is out and about on Wildlife Drive through the live Refuge camera. The camera is positioned on the top of the observation tower and can be rotated 360 degrees.

BLACKWATER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Blackwater NWR was established in 1933 as a waterfowl sanctuary for birds migrating along the Atlantic Flyway. The best time for viewing waterfowl at Blackwater NWR is between October and March, when wintering species such as tundra swans, Canada and snow geese (snow geese arrive with colder weather), and over 20 species of ducks visit the Refuge. The most common ducks are mallards, black ducks, blue-winged teal, green-winged teal, wigeons, and pintails.





SEQUOYAH NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

An estimated 250-plus species of birds are thought to use the bottomland forests and associated habitats in eastern Oklahoma. Bald eagles nest in several locations on the refuge. This majestic bird that nearly vanished from the landscape can be seen in the winter roosting in cottonwoods or swooping over the waters in search of fish or waterfowl.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE & FISH REFUGE

The refuge is located in four states: Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois along the Mississippi River and was established in in 1924 as a refuge for fish, wildlife and plants and a breeding place for migratory birds. The refuge encompasses one of the largest blocks of floodplain habitat in the lower 48 states. Gaze out on the waterfowl migration on Pool 7 from the comfort of your home.





EDWIN B. FORSYTHE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Edwin B. Forsythe NWR was established in 1939 and protects more than 47,000 acres of southern New Jersey coastal habitats. Operated incollaboration with Conserve Wildlife Foundation of New Jersey and Friends of Forsythe, this osprey nest camera provides valuable insight into the life history of ospreys including their behavior, reproduction and diet during the nesting season.
